### YOUNG ADULTS + CANCER

There is never a convenient time to be diagnosed with cancer, but for AYA (adolescent and young adults) cancer patients, individuals aged 15-39, cancer interrupts some of the most formative, pivotal years of their lives. These individuals are building their professional careers, finishing or just beginning college, digging in to or out of financial debt, and planning with excitement for the future. But cancer interrupts that important groundwork.

AYAs face a unique set of challenges. Many feel isolated from their friends and family and frustrated **their life has been put on pause**. They also face added stress from medical debt and potential fertility challenges, and because of their age, face a much longer road dealing with the aftermath of cancer.

#### WHY FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE?

According to the American Cancer Society, "...**young adult survivors have higher rates of bankruptcy** and more frequently forgo needed medical care due to cost compared to older survivors. Financial distress among AYA survivors is often compounded by non-medical costs, such as student loans and raising children."




# **KEY MILESTONES**






**62%** of 118's 2024 spending provided direct support to AYAs.

# **DONOR TRENDS**

In 2024, **167 individuals** generously gave to the 118 Foundation with an average donation of \$202.55. The data below displays a trend in **grassroots partnership** with most donors giving a total of \$500 or less in the calendar year.

## **RESTORATION GRANTS**

118's primary tool to support young adults overcoming cancer is its Restoration Grant program. 118 Foundation is committed to the comeback from cancer and these grants are an investment in that comeback. Recipients may use the grant for whatever they need to find restoration. This year, recipients have used the funds for acupuncture therapy, physical therapy, treating their family to dinner, and celebrating their birthday. Although, the grants are mostly used to offset growing medical bills.



# A guilt-free cup of coffee . . .

Amelia has a heart as big as her home state of Wisconsin. She's an incredible agriculture teacher, helping students with their agricultural projects, training them for competitions, and spending long hours traveling to and from events. But her love for others doesn't stop with her students: She shines light on every person she meets. In fact, she makes a handmade gift for every one of her friends who are getting married, including several quilts.

How does she do it all? Coffee. A direct quote from Amelia: "If I can start my day with black coffee, I can make it through."



Amelia is the first person we served through the Restoration Grant program. In her application, she wrote that she would use the funds for medical bills and to treat herself to a "guilt-free coffee," meaning she could go to a coffee shop and buy herself a simple cup of coffee without experiencing guilt from not putting that money toward medical bills.

Young adults overcoming cancer are crippled by debt, and the stress of that debt holds them back from participating in simple pleasures - like drinking a cup of coffee at a coffee shop without worrying about the price tag. It's dehumanizing.

Because of the Restoration Grant program, Amelia got her guilt-free coffee - and help rebuilding parts of her life that cancer tore down.

### Tearing down brick walls . . .



In October, the Foundation was presented with an opportunity to support a young adult with cancer in a way that was not on the board's radar: a rapid response campaign the Foundation called "Tough Like Thomas." And when you read his story below, you'll see why the Board was moved to act.

Cancer doesn't discriminate against who it decides to attack, and the story is no different for Thomas. Cancer doesn't care that Thomas is 22 years old, has a family who has recently suffered great loss, or that he has a girlfriend and a job and a big, beautiful future ahead of him. Stage 4 cancer hit him and his family like a ton of bricks - and the situation became dire.

Thomas was diagnosed with GIST (a gastrointestinal stromal tumor), which is a very uncommon type of gastrointestinal cancer. As you can imagine, treating an uncommon cancer is extremely difficult and complicated. Unfortunately, healing from this type of cancer comes with an immense cost. As Thomas' mom put it, they... "hit a brick wall," as costs continued to pile up.

Thomas and his family needed hope. They needed love. They needed to know that there is a community that supports Thomas and his family and hasn't given up on his comeback. They needed help tearing down that brick wall.

### 118's network showed up. In just two weeks, 118 raised \$17,225.03 to support Thomas and his family.

## **GOALS + GROWTH**

118's goal is to have church partners and donors in **every region of every state**.

This way, grant recipients can **identify a** community nearby that supports them and is invested in their story.

The 118 Foundation aims to award **100 grants by the year 2034**, meaning, on average, 118 will award three grants per quarter every year starting in 2024. 118's goal is to reach AYAs across the nation, not just in the D.C. area. In order to do so, we aim to continue to build connections with churches, cancer centers, and non-profits across the nation to reach AYAs.

## **2025 AREAS OF FOCUS**



Church partnerships are a key segment of the vision for 118 Foundation. In 2025, 118's goal is to build **5 new church partnerships.** 



The 118 Foundation Board has been overwhelmed by the generosity of our donors and partners and are confidently pursuing a fundraising goal of **\$100,000** in 2025.



118 has a goal of awarding 100 grants by to 2034. To stay on track with that goal, 118 aims to award at least **12 grants** in 2025.



When asked what else 118 can do to support AYAs, Restoration Grant recipients noted the need for community. In 2025, 118 Foundation plans to address this need through a group called **The Restoration Group**. HOPE

When faced with a catastrophe as devastating as cancer, hope seems frivolous, but **it can carry a devastated heart to victory**. Apostle Paul's words in Romans 5:3 guide 118's stake in this principle, reminding us that **hope is strengthened through perseverance**.

# HEALING

The effects of cancer far surpass physical ailments: Cancer attacks the mind and soul as well. Patients and survivors need a full spectrum of healing, and no one exemplifies this type of healing better than Jesus. In Luke 5:17-26, we see Jesus first forgive a man of his sins and then heal him from his sickness, proving the Lord is interested in healing more than just our physical bodies; He wants to mend our souls as well. This idea is central to 118 as this Foundation aims to help cancer patients and survivors find a **full spectrum of healing and recovery**.

# HUMILITY — Matthew 22:36-40

One of the toughest parts of having cancer is losing independence. It's not easy asking for help—especially when it comes to small, everyday tasks. But there is strength in admitting you need assistance, and **118 celebrates those who search for support.** In Matthew 22, Jesus reveals the greatest commandment is to love God and the second is to love your neighbor as yourself. **Humanity was created to support and love each other deeply**, but it can take great humility to accept the need for love and community.



Jons Fund

Jon's Fund is named after Mr. Jon Randles, a gifted and revered pastor and evangelist whose impact on the Christian faith can be felt across the nation especially at his son's church, Waterfront Church DC. His story of perseverance, passion, and strength continues to inspire generations of people, and in his spirit of his dedicated service, the central value of this fund is to provide assistance that impacts generations.

118 will provide financial assistance grants through this fund, and it will grow to be largely supported through church partnerships. Because of this, recipients will have a direct link to a community of faith that supports them.

The Knight Fund

This fund is named after Brandon Knight, who cared for and walked closely beside Sadie as she faced cancer. He consistently provided her support however she needed it, and in the same nature, the money devoted to this fund will be used to ensure 118 can remain flexible and nimble to best serve the AYA community.

This fund is supported by traditional fundraising and crowdsource funding and is married to Jon's Fund to provide greater support to AYAs. The Knight Fund will cover operational costs, special projects, content development, and future expansion. As 118 is still in its infancy, this fund is carefully managed and invested in to ensure the Foundation has sufficient resources to continue to expand its reach.
